


Gary Smith shared with the group using the skew among other things.



Gary's tools he brought to the meeting. They are encased in fire hose. He uses a 12-gauge shotgun brush to clean out the mandrel.





When Gary starts rounding a piece with a skew he will take and make short cuts on the edge to help prevent it from splintering when he rounds it with a planning cut. (Note saw tooth edge on the piece)







Gary then demonstrated how to make a baluster like you might see on a table leg.

After he has rounded the piece to the proper length, he then marks the top of the cut.

He then proceeds to cut the detail with the long point of the skew. In this case he is using an Alen Lacer skew. Notice how the edge is curved as opposed to straight like the one below .

This is the final result of his work.



Gary also pointed out how sharp the edges of a skew can be and the danger that represents when turning. He recommended slightly rounding over the edge of a new skew. He also pointe out how sharp the bottom is and that is should be rounded over slightly also.

He also talked about the pros and cons of an oval skew vs. a square skew. It is a matter of preference and what you get used to using.
